


Designers focus on the relationship of colours and how they can deliver a design concept that leaves audiences in awe. As colour is defined by multi dimensions such as hue, chroma, value, tints and shades they all meet together to define a colours identity and presents an arrangement of colour combinations. This is an important part in the design process as combining the right colours creates the right mood and visual temperature and can determine the success or failure of a decorative scheme. The careful consideration use of colour can unify furnishings and finishes to produce a cohesive and pleasing result.

To determine the right colour creating sketches and mood boards are useful to assess the impact of colour choices. The useful collage of colour swatches, materials, illustrations and styles enables the designer to consider the colour selected. Additionally, this allows for the designer to see the level of contrast in the arrangement of colour to see if the elements chosen creates a visual interest and drama. The element of contrast is represented by the play of one or more colours or its intensities, as contrast can make a scheme more dynamic.

Blues & Grey



Incorporating shades of blue, greys and black into your interior or exterior spaces is an excellent application if you want to evoke a particular mood and vibe to your working space. Blues come in an array of shades that all presents a level of sophistication and comfort to your space, whereas black brings a level of boldness to your design. The strong contrast that both colours make together can be seen in below image a strong sophisticated mix of blue, black and white. The walls are in a deep navy blue and





a black and white tile pattern. The level of energy this illustration presents highlights the perfect synergy of all colours presented.

Tessellated Tile Pattern

The tessellated tile pattern presented to the left is called 'Fitzroy' and comes in a intricate geometric pattern. The beauty in this tessellation comes from the repetition of the main star in different proportions. A simple idea, controlled and organised by a grid to create a dynamic result. Shown here on the diagonal, and elevated by the use of the decorative Norwood border. The tessellated colour arrangement are black, white, blue grey, and blue all applied to create this remarkable pattern. The application is to the exterior verandah of the dwelling. Tessellated tiles is a versatile solution as it can be applied to interiors and exterior spaces, as they are highly durable.




Red & Yellow



The colour red is a powerful tone which provokes very intense feelings and moods. It can evoke a dramatic, fiery and warm ambiance, always leaving an intriguing result and a reaction. Adding red to your interior or exterior spaces is an excellent way to make a special and striking impression. Diverse range of shades of red can have different emotions, such as a fiery red can symbolise love, strength, speed and action, whereas a darker shade of red can evoke elegance, seriousness and charm.

Tessellated Tile Pattern

The tessellated tile pattern presented to the left is called "Chelsea" an intricate star feature in this design, set within a grid shown here for a more dynamic effect, with a double strip Norwood border. There are four colours and a decorative encaustic to give that extra classic look. Applying tessellated tiles to the exterior of your home takes also into account the colour of your facade and the landscaping that will be adjacent to the verandah as it all plays a part in the planning process. To make this design a more contemporary a marble step tread is applied to the tessellated to give it more depth to the end design.



This bathroom setting incorporated red and yellow into its design an excellent application keeping it modern and contemporary a perfect synergy. The flooring and feature wall in black and white contrasts perfectly with the red cabinetry and the yellow wall tiles.

Whites & Blacks

Tessellated Tile Pattern




Greens



Incorporating green into your indoor or outdoor project always leaves a sense of calmness and a relaxed vibe to it. Green commonly communicates peace, balance and harmony. However, with all colours a darker emerald green communicated luxury and elegance. Whereas, a lighter green with blue undertones in a room that receives little natural light makes the room feel even colder. Ultimately, green is often associated with growth renewal, prosperity and regeneration. In the below illustration a commercial hospitality setting has incorporated green craquelé Victorian subway tiles to the counter as a focal point, setting a welcoming and inviting mood. A perfect example to use decorative subway tiles as a feature to your overall design.
